Educational approach

The programme offers multiple engagements in real-life contexts. The focus is on the individual and facilitating his/her search through experiential learning and a total immersion experience. Mentoring is a vital part of this journey.

Basic structure of the programme

The 12 months will be divided into 3 to 4 postings with bridge periods in between. there will be an introductory session, a mid-internship meet with co-travellers and a meeting at the end of one year.

If the myth of tuberculosis control or that of food security has to be busted, one of the places to go to is South Udaipur where BHS is working. The terrain and social determinants are quite challenging

This fellowship is an essential and crucial part of the learning process. I think being a health care provider is incomplete without going through such a rotation, be it long or short, in our career. While safe motherhood is a given in the big cities where we were trained, it remains a distant dream for the mothers in the villages of Orissa. Swasthya Swaraj has opened my eyes to the glaring reality.

This kind of exposure should be mandatory for all doctors since we are only exposed to the tertiary care during our training.
