



ANNUAL REPORT 2021 - 2022

Our Panchayat stopped Covid in its tracks – being the first Panchayat in our district to achieve 100% Covid immunisation, in partnership with the Government.

Covid cast a shadow to everything we did this year – and the Tribal Hospital was the center of most of the work. Closing the tap is as important as mopping the floor has been the Sittilingi approach. We started trying to close the tap almost 3 weeks before the second wave hit us, when the cities were already being hit by the Covid tsunami. Spaced village meetings, education of the small shops etc. When our first cases started showing up and the lockdown announced, the people were ready. Houses tied ropes (with neem twigs in between, to say guests are not welcome; shops followed protocol in not allowing anyone inside; mask usage started increasing; community functions got postponed; frequent announcements through vehicles and the local "tandoora". The hospital too was ready – a 15 bed exclusive Covid ward, protective gear, oxygen, testing, medicines etc. in place.

Though we did run a 15 bed Covid ward, we also spent a lot of energy in the community. The only way the Staff and Ward was not overcome by patients and lack of resources was to have community involvement and community prevention. Our youth came forward to do house to house education, sharing the helplines. Follow ups of suspects by our nurses in the field, psychological support by our docs and nurses of anybody having fever was an additional step. In the end we had admitted 436 patients – our mortality was less than 1%. The Gol Panchayati Raj Ministry tweeted Sittilingi as an example of tackling Covid. We could only do this because the foundation was the community, not the hospital.





The 2nd batch of our Travel Fellowship – now known as the Rural Health Internship (RHI) started off. Here are 5 really enthusiastic young doctors who are willing to give 1 year of their life to travel to 3 or 4 rural health care setups like us (they have a pool of 12 to choose from) and learn about rural health care first hand – and then decide whether they would like to spend their future doing service for the poor or get back to the main stream. The good news is that all 5 seats were filled even in this age of corona, that's something to celebrate about. Youth are the future for our country's health.

TREES ARE GODS GREAT ALPHABET, WITH THEM HE WRITES THE FUTURE OF OUR PLANET:

This year we planted 4000 trees in our valley – 2500 coconut saplings to 250 farmers with the help of friends from Bridgeable Singapore and another 1500 saplings which we grew in our nursery, as well as from other friends' nurseries. The aim is to bolster our watersheds, shade line all our roads and provide a permanent income for our farmers. We plan to repeat this every year for some time.



BUILDING THE ECONOMY WITH WOMEN:

After health, what most affected rural life post–Covid was the economy. People learned that generating money locally was much more sustainable than migrating for work, where there were so many uncertainties. Help came from organizations who understood this, and with their help we were able to build up slowly a revolving fund for boosting the agri–economy through our women groups. Women took loans at a nominal interest to buy cows, make vermi–compost

(to use and sell) or just as an initial starter for their crops to buy seeds and prepare the land. Migration, after all, is one of the major causes of ill-health. **SOFA managed a sales of almost** ₹ **1.5 Crore**, in spite of Covid restrictions.

PORGAI NEWS

Perhaps nothing took a beating like the Craft Initiative. Our main selling platforms were through exhibitions in the cities and Covid closed them down, except for a brief time between the 2 waves. However, Some reputed online platforms agreed to help us and we did manage to salvage the situation to a large extent. **Total sales were ₹ 57.8 lakhs of which ₹ 35.2 lakhs went back to the artisans.**



Sittilingi was the venue chosen by Thannatchi – an organization working for promoting good governance, transparency and peoples involvement at the panchayat level. 18 young and idealistic Panchayat Presidents came from all over TN for 3 days – learning, sharing experiences and what their common frustrations were. There were also presentations and traditional dances at night to make the occasion joyful. By the end of the 3rd day, the seeds of a new movement for a transparent and vibrant Panchayat system started from Sittilingi. Hope starts in small places.



Within two years Ms. Madheswari Manjunathan and her management of the Panchayat in these difficult times was well appreciated throughout Tamizh Nadu. She has already got 3 awards from various institutions.

PLANS FOR THE NEXT YEAR

- Develop a full fledged OPD for the Kalrayan Hills
- Consolidate and improve Community Health interventions
- Develop a farmer Credit System to help farmers not borrow from outside for inputs
- Find new markets for the Craft Initiative
- Refine and improve the Gram Sabha in the Panchayat
